
Word Search Puzzle

THE LATEST NEWS FROM LISA WHITAKER

In this last trip, I was teaching and sharing in a Muslim nation, a Christian nation and a Buddhist/Hindu nation. In every nation, there was an obvious cry to connect with "a god". The Muslim call to pray 5 times a day and their yearly ramadan fast, the church bells that pealed loudly on Easter morning following a century old tradition of remembering Christ's walk to Golgotha and the larger than life statues of the various Hindu/Buddhist gods all were blatant signs to connect with a "higher power".

In theory we all know that humanity searches for meaning and purpose. As I travel to these far corners of the earth, I can testify to the truth of that theory. People long to find a purpose in life. They long to believe that there is "someone" or "something" greater.

As I have been pondering this, I was reminded of something that happened many years ago when I first went to Russia after the Soviet Union fell. Our outreach team went to a part of Russia that had not seen many foreign visitors during Soviet times. We were quite the spectacle as we sang, did dramas and handed out Bibles to school children per request of the local schools. One day I was walking down the street with one of our translators, an older gentlemen in a suit walked up to me and said, "Are you a foreigner?" I said, "Yes, I am". He asked, "Where are you from?" I said, "the United States." He then said something very interesting. He asked, "oh America, so you believe in God?" I was taken back, but quickly replied, "Yes, I do believe in God." He said, "Tell me about Him, we were told He doesn't exist, but please, tell me?" What a privilege it was to share with this man about our amazing God.

I find that hunger to know God is still very real. People in very isolated villages in the world have an innate sense that there is "Someone" they are to be connected to, in relationship with or to whom they must serve. I have been reminded on this trip of Jesus' words in Acts1 before He ascended.

"You will be my witnesses . . . even to the remotest parts of the earth"

Thank you for praying for me and supporting me as I have the privilege of going to some of these remote places. There are so many who have never heard, even in our own backyard, but certainly in places we have never heard of - and yet Jesus said to GO! I will continue to GO as long as I can and am so grateful for all you do to allow me to go. What a gift to share who He is with others.

APRIL IS ALCOHOL AWARENESS MONTH

About 18 million adults have an alcohol use disorder (AUD), a condition that applies to people who have strong cravings for alcohol, can't control their drinking, show withdrawal symptoms if they stop drinking, and continue to drink despite health or other alcohol-related problems. AUD can range from mild to severe, and can affect anyone, regardless of age, gender, ethnicity, profession, or financial status.

Unfortunately the stigma that still surrounds alcohol use may prevent people from getting the help they need. Stigma refers to the negative thoughts, attitudes, and beliefs about people or groups based on characteristics that set them apart from others, such as mental health conditions including AUD. Stigma can cause people to downplay how often they drink, how much they drink, and the impact drinking has on their life.

Identify your drinking habits Excessive alcohol use includes binge drinking and heavy drinking.

- Binge drinking = 5+ drinks for men and 4+ drinks for women within a 2-hour period.
- Heavy drinking = 14+ drinks for men and 7+ drinks for women within a week.

Understand the dangers of alcohol Excessive alcohol use increases a person's risk of stroke, liver cirrhosis, alcoholic hepatitis, cancer, and other serious health conditions. It leads to risk-taking behavior, such as driving while impaired and unprotected sex. Alcohol also increases the risk of death from car crashes, injuries, homicide, and suicide.

If you think you may have a problem It is important to overcome stigma, be honest about your drinking habits, and seek support from a health care provider.
